

Congratulations on being invited to interview!



If you feel a bit nervous about what to do or what to expect, that's perfectly normal. Your interview is effectively an extension of your UCAS application. It's a chance for admissions tutors to get to know more about you, and a chance for you to get to know the university.

Know where and when you're going

Read your invitation to interview carefully. It will tell you where to go, what time to arrive, and what to bring with you. If you are unsure about anything, contact the admissions office. It's better to ask now than to be confused on the day.

Be prepared

Prepare to talk about your UCAS application. Be ready to discuss your achievements, your interests, and your reasons for wanting to study at the university. Think about your strengths and weaknesses, and how you have overcome challenges. Prepare some questions to ask your interviewer.

Check you've got everything you need

Check that you have everything you need for the interview. This includes your UCAS application, your identification, and any other documents you need to bring. Make sure you have enough time to get to the university and to find the interview room.

Try to feel (or at least look!) ready

Try to feel (or at least look!) ready for the interview. Dress formally but comfortably. Arrive on time. Be polite and professional. Show your enthusiasm for the university and the course.

Don't be hard on yourself. Remember that the interview is just one part of the selection process. It's okay to feel nervous. Just do your best and be yourself.

Make the most of your visit to the university. Use the opportunity to see the campus, meet staff, and talk to other students.

Quick tips

1. Read your invitation to interview thoroughly. You need to know where you are going, what time your interview is, and what you need to bring with you.
2. Read over your UCAS application, information on the course you have applied for and some general information about the university to prepare.
3. Do some extra reading. Have there been any developments in your field? E.g. Any new research developments in

5. Dress formally but comfortably.
6. Prepare questions to ask your interviewer.
7. Use the interview as an opportunity to learn as much about the university as possible.
